

Cops look for rape suspect



Police are asking for the assistance of the public in identifying a sexual assault suspect stemming from an incident that occurred Jan. 25.

Around 6:30 p.m., officers with the Pueblo Police Department responded to a residence in the Belmont area near East High School on a report of a sexual assault.

Upon investigation, police learned a male suspect entered the home and sexually assaulted a woman.

The male is described as being 5 feet 10 inches to 6 feet tall, weight between 180 and 200 pounds, has a

medium to muscular build and light-colored eyes, according to police.

The suspect had a tooth missing from the top row of his mouth, just to the left of his front tooth. He

also had a distinct odor of grease or oil, which police said could mean he's a mechanic.

Investigators had a professional sketch artist compile a drawing of the suspect the way he appeared the night of the attack.

Superfund meeting Tuesday

EPA wants to sample yards in Eilers area

The old Colorado Smelter slagpile in the Eilers neighborhood is now an official federal Superfund site but identifying which yards and businesses need cleanup is just getting underway.

Environmental Protection Agency and state health department officials have scheduled two public meetings Tuesday to explain the Superfund process and to encourage Eilers residents to have their yards sampled for lead and arsenic contamination.

They sent requests to 2,600 property owners in the South Side neighborhood in November and received permission to test soil from about 500 owners thus far.

"We'll be explaining the sampling process and doing follow-up as part of those meetings in Pueblo," Chris Wardell, EPA's community coordinator said last week.

Anyone wanting to discuss individual sites or soil sampling with the EPA or the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment is invited to an availability meeting with their experts from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at St. Mary's Help of Christians Church, 307 E. Mesa Ave.

A more formal public meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. that evening at the Robert Hoag Rawlings Public Library, 100 E. Abriendo Ave., in the Ryals Room.

At the later meeting, EPA will explain and review the current status of

the project, introduce the members of its local Community Advisory Group and review the sampling program.

The old smelter site was put on the federal National Priorities List, commonly called Superfund, because of soil tests in the area that showed some yards and locations had high levels of lead contamination and in fewer areas, arsenic as well.

EPA officials believe the contamination came from the old Colorado Smelter slagpile. That smelter was closed by the American Smelting and Refining Co. nearly 100 years ago.

The EPA has hired Pacific Western Technologies to do the soil testing and remedial cleanup work in the area.

200 out with EVRAZ layoffs

The downturn in U.S. oil drilling will prompt EVRAZ to lay off up to 200 workers at its Pueblo steel mill beginning today, the company announced last Wednesday.

"Due to declining oil prices and significant reductions in drilling programs, EVRAZ is making production adjustments and temporarily crewing down where needed," according to a statement issued by EVRAZ North America senior communications manager Melodie Ruse.

"Today, we announced that we will temporarily curtail production at our seamless pipe facility in Pueblo. The temporary layoff affects up to 200 employees. We continue to closely monitor the market and will bring these employees back to work as soon as we can."

Call center plans layoffs

iQor plans to lay off as many as 251 workers at its Pueblo call center by March, according to a letter the company recently sent to the state Department of Labor and Employment.

The call center operated by iQor is the former Receivable Management Services, or RMS, call center at 317 N. Main St.

iQor, based in New York City, acquired RMS and the 500-worker Pueblo center

in 2010. A short time later, the company announced the addition of 250 jobs. It is unknown how many are currently employed at the center.

U.S. 50 widening to start this week

The Colorado Department of Transportation is preparing to start work on a project to widen portions of U.S. 50 West and improve intersections along the highway.

The main thrust of the project will be adding a third traffic lane on the eastbound portion of the highway between Purcell Boulevard in Pueblo West and Wills Boulevard.

The total cost of the project is \$12 million.

I dies in police shooting

Orlando Jude Lopez, 26, was killed by police last Sunday after he fired at officers who chased him on foot into a field east of Praise Assembly of God church, 2000 Troy Ave.

Lopez and a second man, Roberto Felix Rodriguez-Garcia, 22, were being pursued by police as suspects in a home invasion at about 11:50 a.m. on the 1200 block of East 10th Street.

Rodriguez-Garcia was arrested on suspicion of first-degree burglary and menacing with a deadly weapon in connection with the home invasion. He is in jail without bail pending a court hearing.

Schilling wins council seat

Former Councilman Bob Schilling won the District 1 seat on City Council last Tuesday — a seat he held a decade ago. Schilling, 67, and a real estate agent with Jones-Healy, served two previous terms on council. He defeated Eric Medina, a Colorado Department of Transportation employee.

Tuesday's election means council once again will have its full complement of seven members.

The special election originally was scheduled as a recall contest for former Councilwoman Ami Nawrocki, but she resigned from office on Jan. 13, the day before ballots were mailed out.
